## A CLOSER LOOK: D2D 6.0 BY THE NUMBERS

D2D measurement reflects the four **C**s of primary care identified by Barbara Starfield: **C**ontinuity, **C**oordination, First **C**ontact, and **C**omprehensiveness.

These are the principles that guide AFHTO.

89.9% Patients involved*	Patients who say they're as involved in decisions about their care as they want to be. Why it matters: Two-thirds of patients say they want to be equal partners, at least, with their physician when making decisions about their care (AFHTO/Patients Canada 2015).
77.2% Reasonable wait*	Patients who say they can book an appointment within a reasonable time.  Why it matters: Timely access to care is important to patients, but it does not necessarily, or only, mean same-day or next-day appointments.
5.8% Readmission*	Patients readmitted to hospital within 30 days of discharge.  Why it matters: Readmission is a measure of overall system integration and coordination of care across hospitals, community services and primary care providers.
70.1% Continuity of care*	Visits by patients with their own primary care provider.  Why it matters: This indicator demonstrates continuity of care with a primary care physician, which enhances patient-provider relationships. It is one of the indicators that matters most to patients.
68.1-70.1% Cancer screening*	Eligible patients screened for cervical and colorectal cancer.  Why it matters: Early detection of cancer can save lives.
88.2% Courtesy of office staff*	Patients who say they're satisfied with the courtesy of office staff.  Why it matters: Courtesy of office staff is a driver of high-quality primary care. (Conference Board of Canada, 2014).
67.2% Diabetes care	Diabetes care composite indicator – average score.  Why it matters: Managing chronic conditions like diabetes involves tracking more than one process or outcome of care. This composite indicator includes regular blood-sugar testing, appropriate blood-sugar levels, and the appropriate use of medication to manage cholesterol.
64.9% Childhood immunization*	Eligible children immunized according to public health recommendations.  Why it matters: Immunization is essential to population health and is particularly important for infants and young children, who are most susceptible to vaccine-preventable diseases.
\$2490	<b>Total health-care system cost per patient. Why it matters</b> : High quality comprehensive primary care is the foundation of a sustainable health-care system (Starfield). D2D data show this link between high quality care and lower
